of pooling fields

"barely at interstices of academia"

becoming a discipline

critiques

- No consistent definition of "terrorism"
- Insufficient rigor in research
- Too sympathetic to terrorism
- Too state-centric & security focused


How are America's top universities & colleges, the ones that usually set trends, handling this situation?

not on teaching (knowledge dissemination)




questions

- 4. What are the dominant topics?


methods



- Qualitative studies


